American Academy of Research Historians of Medieval Spain

The American Academy of Research Historians of Medieval Spain (AARHMS) was founded in 1974 by a small group of historians who shared a common interest in medieval Iberia. Since 1976 it has been an 'affiliated society' of the American Historical Association, and has continuously sponsored research presentations at the AHA annual meetings, at the International Medieval Congress at Kalamazoo, and in other national and regional settings.

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1. ELKA KLEIN: in memoriam

Elka Klein, assistant professor of Judaic Studies at the University of Cincinnati, died March 28, 2005, after a nineteen-month fight with ovarian cancer. She is survived by her parents, Suzanne Silk Klein and Martin Klein, emeritus professor of African history at the University of Toronto; her brother; her husband, Yoseff Francus; and their children, Dina and Shaul.

Elka began her academic career at Yale University, where she was graduated summa cum laude in 1988 with majors in History and Religious Studies. Both majors were earned with distinction. From there, she went on to a graduate career studying with Thomas Bisson at Harvard University. After graduation, she was Dorot Postdoctoral Fellow at New York University. Since 2001, she had taught in the Judaic Studies Department at the University of Cincinnati.

Although her career was brief, Elka had already produced an impressive body of research. Her first book, *Hebrew Deeds of Catalan Jews, 1117-1316* (Barcelona: Institut d'Estudis Catalans and Patronat Call de Girona) appeared in 2004. An edition and translation of deeds in Hebrew from the archiepiscopal archive, this important book made use of Elka's rare expertise in both Hebrew and Latin. Her monograph, *Jews, Christian Society, and Royal Power in Medieval Barcelona*, is forthcoming this winter from the University of Michigan's series on History, Languages, and Cultures of the Spanish and Portuguese Worlds and promises to revise fundamentally our understanding of the Jewish community's relationship with the Christian community in which it was situated.
